The Early Scandanavian Settlement in South-East Queensland

According to the Queensland Historical Atlas:-

"The defining feature of Colonial Queensland was its high immigration population.

In a concentrated effort to populate the land with European settlers, Queensland Colonial administrators had enacted a pioneering immigration policy between 1860 and 1901, allowing Queensland to claim the highest percentage of foreign residents of all Australian colonies in 1891. As well as the multitude of English, Irish, Scottish and German settlers that accepted government offers of open land and assisted passage, there was also a significant Scandanavian element that would call Queensland home."

Dr. Robert Ørsted-Jensen was originally educated in Social Science (M.Soc.Sc) at the University of Roskilde in Denmark, and has previously worked in the Danish parliament. He is a PhD from the School of Political Science and International Studies at University of Queensland. He has for some years, nurtured a particular interest in historical institutionalism of Colonial Australia, Colonial politics, human rights and frontier race relations. He is otherwise versed in the political history of Northern Europe and Russia during the nineteenth and into the twentieth century and nurtured additional interest in the immigration, land and settlement policies of Colonial Queensland

Come along and listen to Robert speak about the influence early Scandinavian settlers had on South-East Queensland.



MARCH 2022 NEWSLETTER

At the February meeting Robin Kleinschmidt OAM gave an informative presentation on the early German presence in South-East Brisbane area. A copy of Robin's address is currently being put into a binder and will be added to the Eris Jolly library for members to borrow.

It had been planned to have a speaker from the Cross River Rail project speak to us at the April meeting. However, owing to several circumstance including the February floods this talk has been deferred until later in the year, possibly June. Fortunately we have been able to engage Dr. Robert Ørsted-Jensen who will speak about the early Scandanavian settlers in the South-East Queensland area. This is a nice segue following the talk last meeting about German settlement in the South-East Brisbane area. Robert has undertaken considerable research into Scandanavian and particularly Danish migration.

The information presented here comes from mostly from 'From Law to War' written by Lt. Col. Robert Likeman.

It is a beautifully written, comprehensive book on the life of Lachlan Wilson.

Lachlan Wilson was born 11 July 1871 at "Talbarra" Waterford on the Logan River. Talbarra was the property of his parents Charles Wilson and Amy Mary Chisholm. They were pioneering farmers in the area whose parents had emigrated from Scotland.

Lachlan was the third of their six children.

[In the year of Grace 1871 Australia was far removed from the turmoil in Europe.]

Charles Wilson tried several ventures, growing and milling sugar in the Logan area. Eventually the family left the area and settled in Cleveland Road Coorparoo.

Lachlan and his brother Colin were in the first intake of pupils to Coorparoo State School in January 1876.

The education was good there and Lachlan won a scholarship to the Brisbane Grammar School where he studied for three years before being employed in the public service in the Lands Department. He also took up studies for the Bar and entered the Bar in 1895.

In 1899 the Second Boer War began and Australia was asked to send soldiers. In December 1899 the second contingent of the Queensland Mounted Infantry began training and left on the "Maori King" in January 1900. The AMP Society paid by Queensland Government gave life insurance to Chauvel's Mounted Infantry. Wilson was taken prisoner during this war because he would not abandon his wounded friend (from high school days) Buchanan. They were released after four days.

After returning from the Boer War he practised law in Townsville and in 1903 married Nellie Grant Hartley.

He joined the AIF as a Major in September 1914. His regiment was the 5th Light Horse Regiment. He went to North Africa and then Gallipoli. He became Lt. Colonel on recommendation of Field Marshall Sir William Birdwood.

There among other constant fields of action he repulsed the Turks and took a position thereafter named "Wilson's Lookout".

After Gallipoli the 5th were sent to Egypt and Palestine. They were the first Australian regiment to cross the Suez Canal.

They used a Queensland spear point pump to tap wells in the desert.

In 1917 he took over the 2nd Light Horse Regiment becoming Colonel and acting Brigadier General in charge of 3rd Light Horse.

Two significant operations - assisting capture of Bersheba and in 1918 they made their successful entry into Damascus ahead of the legendary Lawrence of Arabia.

They were treated as saviours and emancipists by the locals showering them with confetti, rosewater, rugs, silk, perfumes, flowers and fruits.

He was respected by his men and idolised by the majority. "The Colonel will never lead us into a death trap".

Throughout three strenuous campaigns his cool calculating brain was ceaselessly active in striving for every comfort possible for the men and their true friend the horse.

Returning to Australia he was active in public life especially the RSSAILA and Commander of the Voluntary Defence Corps 1941-1945.

The going down of the sun.

Lachlan Chisholm Wilson's last official engagement was as head of the Anzac Day Parade April 1945. He died at home on 7 April 1947. His home was 325 Bowen Terrace New Farm. He was three months short of 76 years. He was the last of the Light Horse Generals to fade away. End of an era.

Wilson is buried at Toowong Cemetery beside his wife Nellie and daughter Betty.

A simple slab on the southside of the hill denotes his final resting place.
